

WHO ARE THE SINGLE PARENTS?

- A steady decline of two-parent households in the US:
 - 87% in 1960
 - 73% in 2000
 - 69% today
- 82.2% are mothers, and 17.8% are fathers
- Only a portion of single parents are divorced
- Children from single-parent households often lack routines, like eating dinner together (US Census Bureau, November 2017)

SINGLE-PARENT HOUSEHOLDS

MOTHERS


- 16% are cohabiting with a partner
- Median income is \$26,000
- 18% have a bachelor's degree

FATHERS

- 41% are cohabiting with a partner
- Median income is \$40,000
- 23% have a bachelor's degree




WHY DO WE CARE?

- We are in the ministry of accompanying others toward a relationship with Jesus Christ.
- There are approximately 15 million single moms in the U.S.
- 67% of single parents are not actively attending a local church.
- Less than 1% of Christian Evangelical churches have a formalized ministry to serve this audience.
- If we do not do something, we are MISSING OUT!

"Special attention is to be given in the guidance of single-parent families, so that women who have to bear alone the responsibility of providing a home and raising their children can receive assistance."

HOW DO WE REACH THEM?

- Look within your walls
- Drive around your community
- Solicit the audience



EVALUATE YOUR HOMILIES

- Do your homilies include single parents?
- Be sensitive to the widowed and divorced on holidays
- Make an invitation



CREATE A HOSPITABLE ENVIRONMENT

- Offer childcare
- Offer a meal in conjunction with meetings and presentations
- Sit next to a single parent and offer assistance during the Mass
- Invite them into ministry
- Adopt a single-parent family



CREATE OUTREACH OPPORTUNITIES

- Childcare
- Meals
- Financial assistance
- Spiritual support and prayer warriors
- Household and car maintenance



FORM A MINISTRY

- Empower single parents to be a resource for each other
- Teach them how to pray and answer their questions about the faith
- Identify their needs, teach them skills and provide them resources
 - Control vs. No Control
 - Achieving Balance
 - Finance & Budgeting
 - Discipline vs. Punishment
 - Loneliness & Dating







